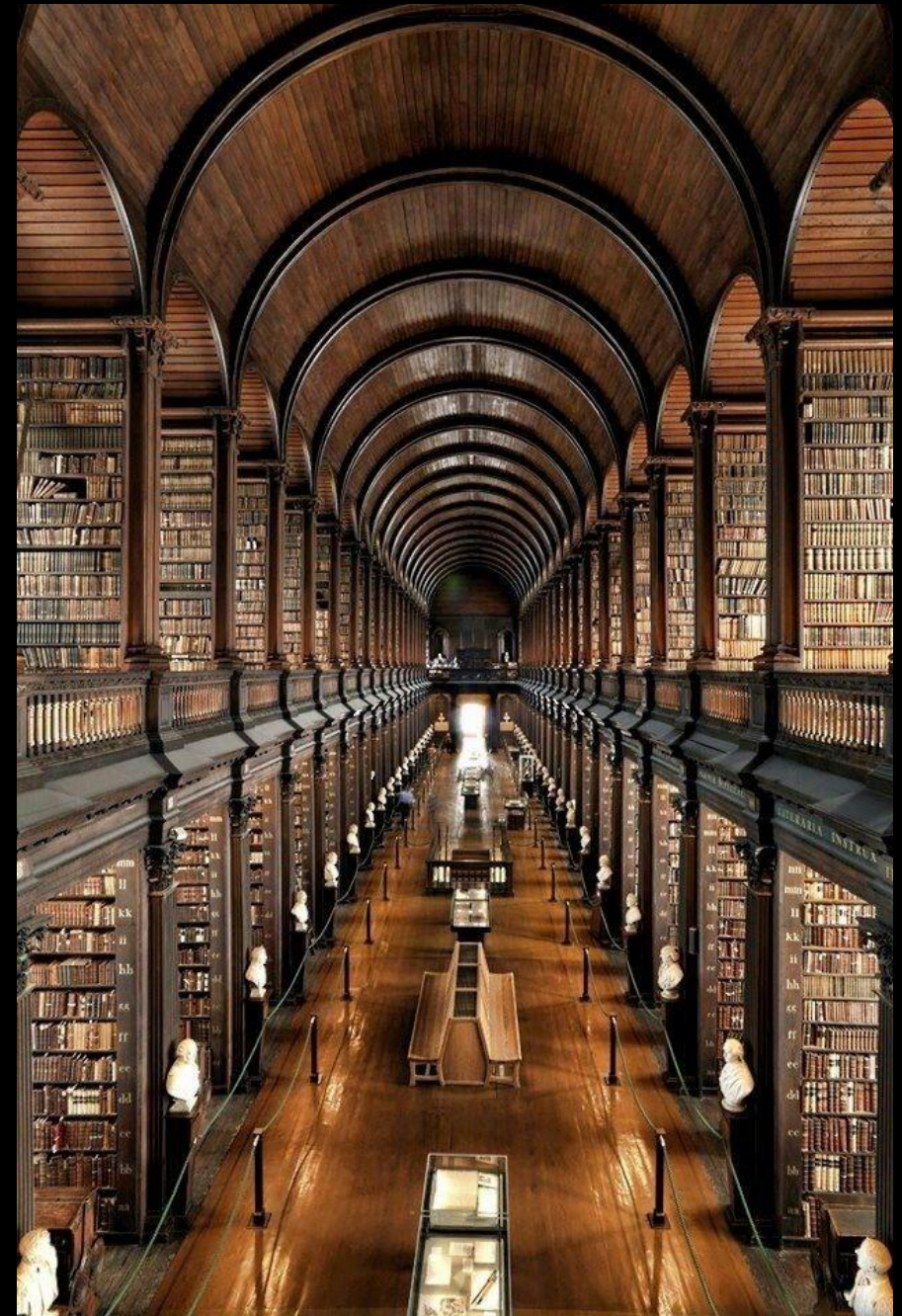

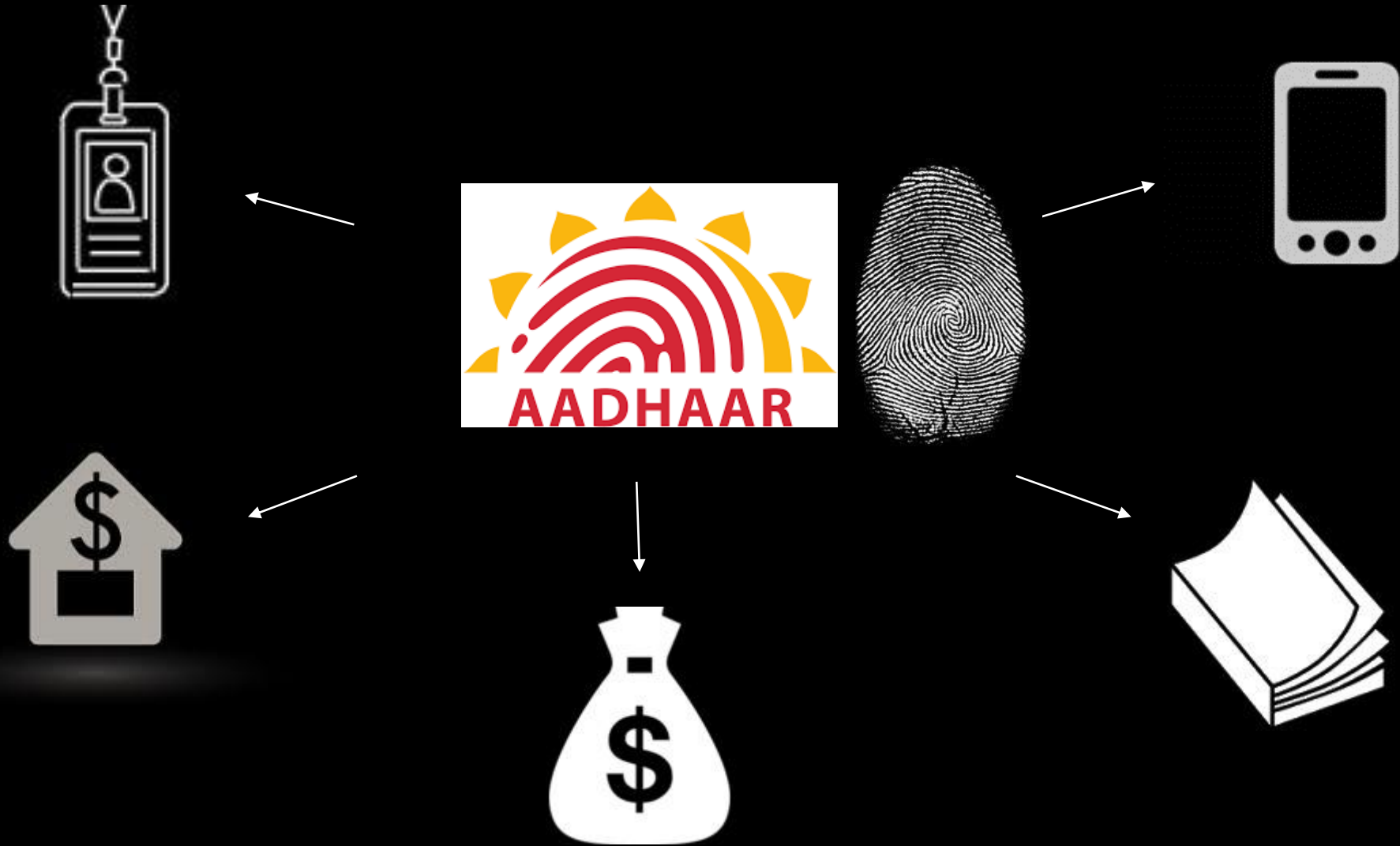
# The machine readable society

By 2130, profiling will be based on data gathered over generations



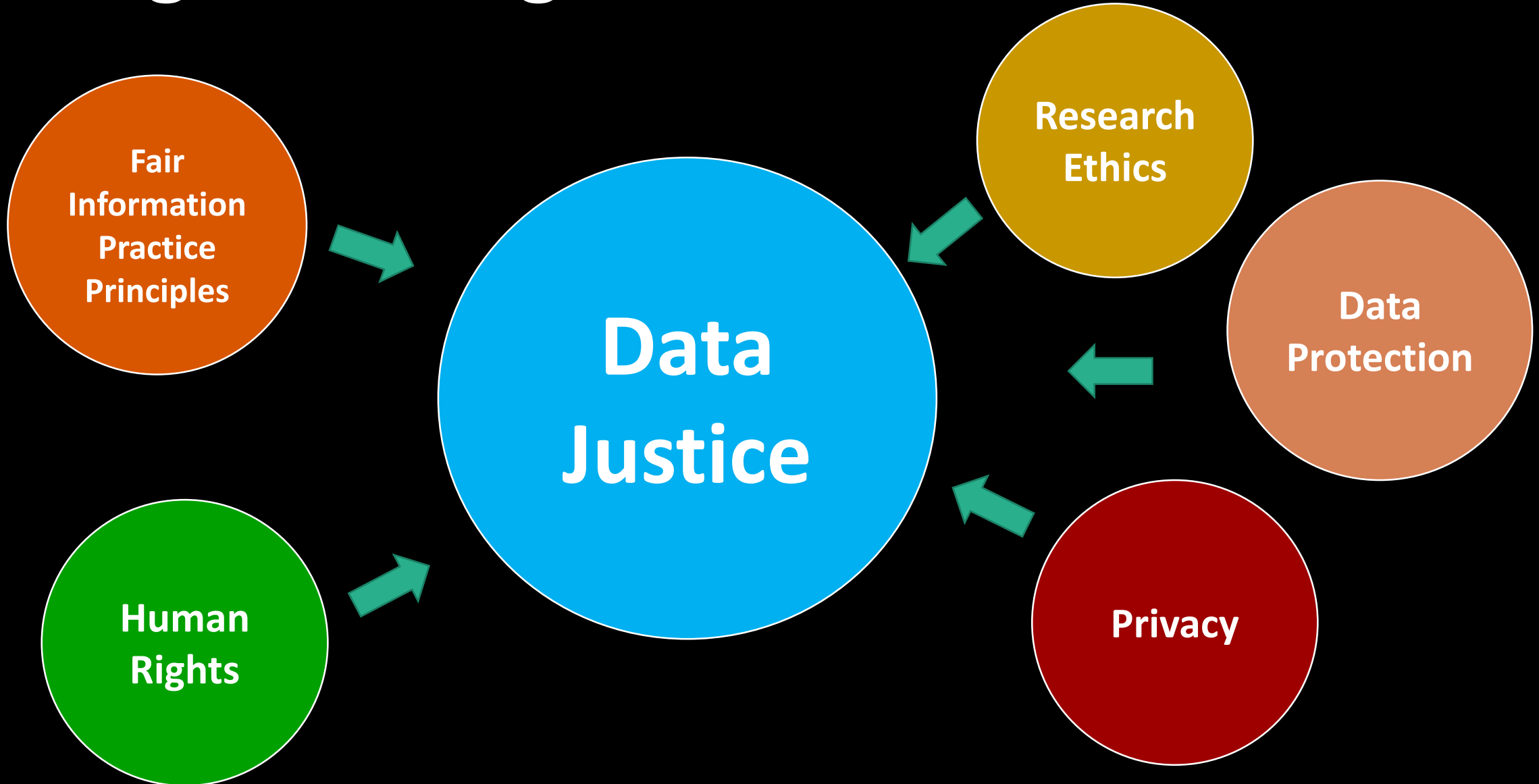
# Datafied development



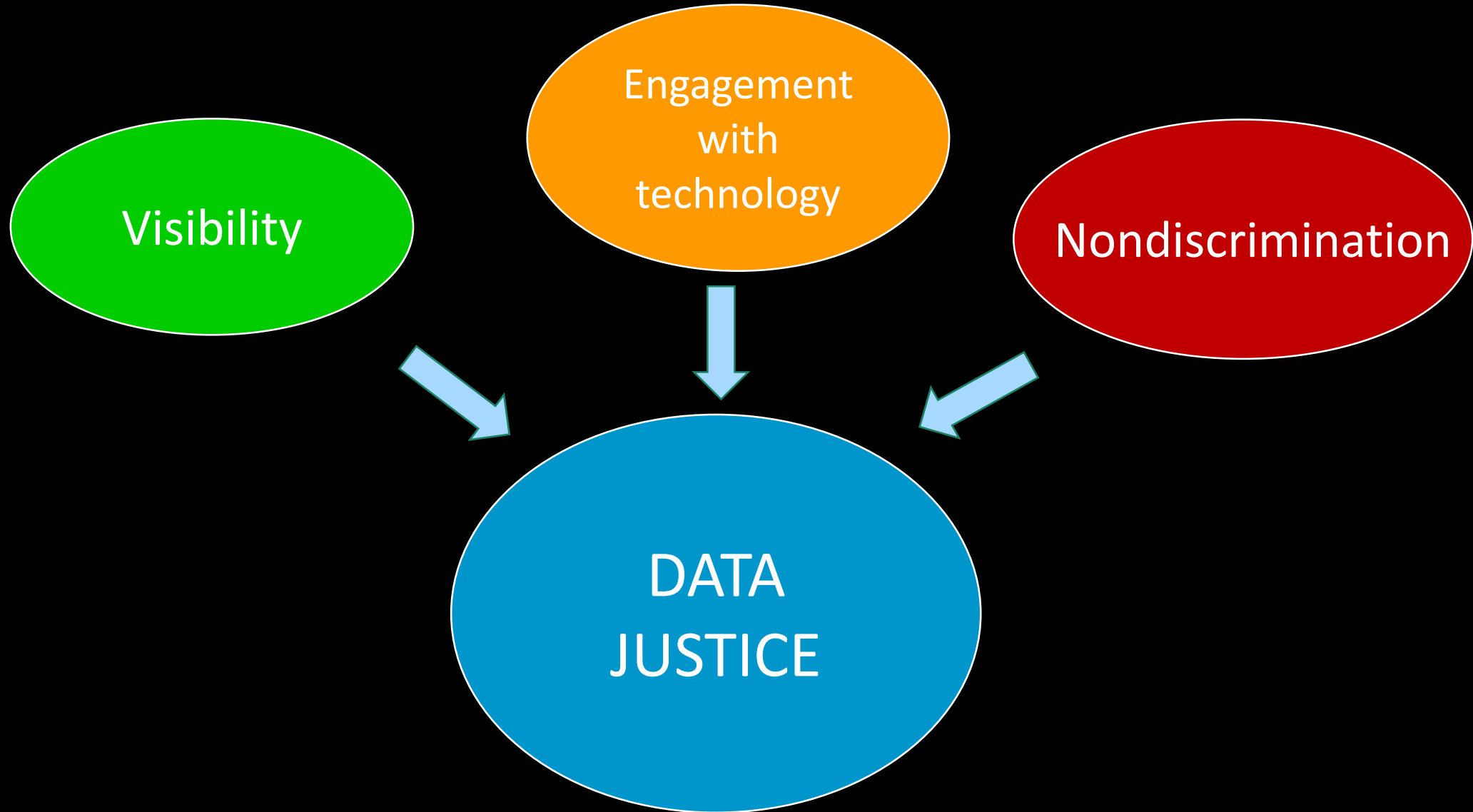


In a global data market, the worst-case scenario eventually becomes the standard for us all.
